

Supplement 1. List of notable extratropical storms (sources: media reports, state and federal government agencies, scientific reports. Notes: (1) from September through April, the U.S. east coast is battered by up to 40 nor'easters spanning hundreds -- even thousands -- of miles in diameter; (2) Extratropical storms can impact coasts for days. In those cases, we selected the most representative day of impact for largest swath of coast.
